I still did not see even one butterfly. Maybe a smaller mountain would be better. At least it would be easier and I was getting tired.

It was out on an island, so I rested a little while crossing the water by ferry before I climbed to the top of the mountain. The other side looked promising, but I just had to climb back up the mountain again to find my way back to the boat launch and the ferry home.

At the top I looked around...

Flat, the paper is the map. Show the map or demonstrate looking at the map. Rotate and fold another mountain.

Collapse the water-bomb base...
...and rotate $180^{\circ}$ to show the smaller mountain.

Fold the sharp corners up to the top of the mountain.


...and I could see the boat leaving.
...and I could see the boat leaving. It would be a while before the next ferry, so I went down to a field near the dock and found a comfortable spot.

After that long walk, it felt good to stretch out my legs under an old oak.

I leaned back against the trunk, cushioning my head with my hands.

Fold the bottom edge straight upward, but leave the square corner peeking out from behind.

Turn the model over.

Bring the corners down using a squash fold.

Make a small pleat to distinguish the head and hold layers of paper together.

Mountain fold in half.

Coming here took a while, but I guessed I had only taken about half the time until the next ferry. I thought I would rest for the other half.


I didn't though, because there among the wildflowers...

Valley fold one wing.
...was not just one butterfly...
Mountain fold the other wing to match.

But many!

Next time I'll spare my sore feet and check the fields of wildflowers first!
...and show the other side.
